



REMEMBERING SREBRENICA

In July 1995, Bosnian Serb forces, led by General Ratko Mladić overran and captured the town of Srebrenica in Eastern Bosnia which had been declared a UN Safe Area in 1993. In the days following Srebrenica's fall, more than 8,000 Bosnian Muslim men and boys were systematically massacred and buried in mass graves. Thousands of women, children and elderly people were forcibly deported. Srebrenica was the culmination of a campaign of 'ethnic cleansing' used during the conflict by Bosnian Serb forces, to achieve their aim of forming a 'Greater Serbia' free from Bosnian Muslims. Throughout Bosnia, between 20,000 – 50,000 women and girls suffered rape and sexual violence; a weapon of war used to systematically 'ethnically cleanse' communities and terrorise them into fleeing.

On the 11th July we will honour the victims and survivors of the genocide, and pledge ourselves to creating a better, stronger and more cohesive society in the United Kingdom.
